

Parent Letter – Autumn Term

The Religious Education Directory (RED) has now been introduced from Reception to Year Four. This parent letter outlines what the children will learn, following the RED, during the Autumn Term. Year Five and Six continue to follow the previous programme of Come and See. By September 2026, they will also follow the RED. The termly parent letter will reflect the changes in learning for these classes.

Branch One – Creation and Covenant

This will be delivered in the first half of the Autumn Term. (The colour green is used to represent ‘ordinary time’ within the church’s liturgical calendar)

Branch Two – Prophecy and Promise

This will be delivered in the second half of the Autumn Term. (The colour purple is used to represent the season of advent)

Reception

The children begin by learning that God made each of us. Children explore how families are a gift from God and that we show love in our families towards each other. The children recognise that God created everything and said it was good. Children take time to explore what good means and that all creation is good, should be cherished and looked after. They reflect on how they can look after our beautiful world and how we are asked to show stewardship to God’s creations. Finally, the children learn about the Sacrament of Baptism and how we celebrate becoming part of God’s family through this special sacrament.

Throughout Branch 2, children will know that Mary was chosen by God to be Jesus’ mother. They will learn that Mary and Joseph travelled to Bethlehem and that Jesus was born in a stable and laid in a manger. Children will know that the shepherds visited Jesus at the stable and that Advent is a time to get ready for Christmas. Finally children will know that Jesus came for the whole world.

Year One and Year Two

Pupils will consider how the world exists and how all that is came to be. They will learn about the Christian belief that all that exists comes from God, the Creator, who Christians call Father, and that this belief is found in Scripture. The children will learn to recognise that it is a story about how God reveals his love, not a scientific account. Children will hear the opening words of the Nicene Creed as they express the belief that all that is comes from God, who created all that is seen, and all that is unseen. All pupils will be invited to reflect on what prayer means for them in their lives. Finally, children will reflect on the message in Laudato Si and how we all need to take care of God’s creation

Throughout Branch 2, children will understand that the Bible is a special book and encounter the stories and accounts of how people came to know God and the Good News of Jesus in the gospels. Children will sequence the accounts from the Annunciation through to the visit of the shepherds and know that in the Annunciation, God called Mary and she said ‘Yes’ to his call. Children will recognise that, for Christians, the Christmas story reveals God’s love by sending Jesus his Son.

Year Three and Year Four

In Years 3 and 4, the children begin by learning that the Creation stories in Genesis use symbolism to explain the relationship between God, human beings, and the world. They reflect on the notion that without God, our lives are empty, chaotic and lack purpose. The children read prayers, poems and psalms about creation, acknowledging the meaning behind them and reflecting on what is wonderful about our world. They also reflect on how the praise of Creation is reflected in St Francis's Canticle of the Creatures before understanding what it means to be a steward of creation. Children then recognise that in Laudato Si', Pope Francis teaches that human beings are called to have a loving relationship with God, with each other, and with the world.

Children learn about the first part of the Mass. They will recognise and name some of the objects in a church and will understand why Catholics go to Mass. They will learn the different rules people have when they take part in Mass as well as the structure of Mass, naming the different parts of the Liturgy of the Word. Children will then learn about Advent and the signs and symbols that help Catholics live out this special season. They will learn about the Annunciation to Joseph and explore the meaning of the story.

Year Five and Year Six

As these classes are still following the Programme Come and See, their topics will look a little different:

Learning at Home – How can you support your child at home?

- † Read the story of Creation together from a child's version of the Bible and say a prayer to God to give thanks for all the wonderful things that He has created.
- † Talk to your child about their role and responsibility in God's creation and how we can all create a positive world around us following the example of Jesus.
- † Go on creation walks to inspire awe and wonder.
- † Take your child outside to take photos of things they love in the world
- † Ask your child to think about what they can do to make the world a better place.

- † Discuss with the children how your family welcomes visitors to your home.
- † Find out about some Christian symbols for Advent e.g. Advent wreath, calendar, Jesse tree. Use the CAFOD or Missio websites to get a religious Advent calendar.
- † Discuss with your child how we prepare for the coming of Jesus. Find out about some Christian symbols for Advent e.g. advent wreath, calendar, Jesse tree.
- † Challenge your child to reflect on the true meaning of Christmas through their actions. You could visit the CAFOD or Mission Together website to get a religious Advent calendar and complete their daily task to help you prepare for the coming of Christ.

The school CAFOD Club also take part in the fundraising ideas, coming up with their own ways to raise money. ALL SAINTS (1 November)

We celebrate the lives of special and ordinary people who have responded to God's invitation to love.
